Application Requirements

Each applicant must:

- ▶ Live in or attend school in Anza Electric's service area.
- ▶ Be a high school junior.
- ▶ Complete a Youth Tour application.
- ▶ Write a composition.
- ▶ Participate in an interview with a panel of judges.

Composition Requirements

Each applicant must:

- ▶ Write a letter to one elected representative (see names & addresses listed in the packet)
- ▶ Pick **one** topic of your choice:
 - An issue that affects our community that you feel this particular individual may be able to assist with. **OR**
 - Discuss an idea that would help bring jobs to the area.
- ▶ Must be written in correct letter format.
- ▶ Must include your return mailing address as these may be submitted to the elected representative.
- ▶ Font size must not be larger than size 12.
- ▶ Letter must be typewritten.

Consider bringing your composition/letter and application by the Co-op office earlier than 12/5/24.

Come to the interview prepared to answer these questions without any notes. We'll get in touch with you with the interview date, time and place. It will most likely take place in mid-December.

1. What are your goals for the future? Where do you see yourself in 5 years? 10 years?
2. If you could sit down and talk to anyone (living or deceased) in Washington D.C., who would it be and why?
3. What is the most important thing your parents or grandparents have taught you and how has that helped you?
4. What particular strengths do you have which would make you a good individual to send on the tour?
5. There are seven cooperative principles that Anza Electric Cooperative and other cooperatives abide by. In reading the information you've been given, what is one of the cooperative principles?
6. Can you expand on the definition of the principle?
7. Who is inspiring to you and why?

The Seven Cooperative Principles (1-4)

VOLUNTARY AND OPEN MEMBERSHIP

Cooperatives are voluntary organizations open to all persons able to use their services and willing to accept the responsibilities of membership, without gender, social, racial, political or religious discrimination.

DEMOCRATIC MEMBER CONTROL

Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. The elected representatives are accountable to the membership. In primary cooperatives, members have equal voting rights (one member, one vote) and cooperatives at other levels are organized in a democratic manner.

MEMBERS' ECONOMIC PARTICIPATION

Members contribute equitably to, and democratically control, the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital is usually the common property of the cooperative. Members usually receive limited compensation, if any, on capital subscribed as a condition of membership. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing the cooperative, possibly by setting up reserves, part of which at least would be indivisible; benefitting members in proportion to their transactions with the cooperative; and supporting other activities approved by the membership.

AUTONOMY AND INDEPENDENCE

Cooperatives are autonomous, self-help organizations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with other organizations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control by their members and maintain their cooperative autonomy.

The Seven Cooperative Principles (5-7)

EDUCATION, TRAINING AND INFORMATION

Cooperatives provide education and training for their members, elected representatives, managers, and employees so that they can contribute effectively to the development of their cooperatives. They inform the general public, particularly young people and opinion leaders, about the nature and benefits of cooperation.

COOPERATION AMONG COOPERATIVES

Cooperatives serve their members most effectively and strengthen the cooperative movement by working together through local, national, regional and international structures.

CONCERN FOR COMMUNITY

While focusing on member needs, cooperatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies accepted by their members.
